Defining Our Role and Our Goal in Church Growth

Introduction

- 1. Teaching and converting non-Christians was my number one priority when I first began preaching full-time.
 - a. I have always found personal evangelism the most rewarding of all activities associated with teaching.
 - b. I hope it remains an important priority, even if the last four and a half years have yielded little fruit.
- 2. Over the years, my thinking on our role and goals in evangelism has changed somewhat.
 - a. Evangelism provides a teacher with his highest highs and his lowest lows. 3Jn. 4; 2Co. 2:4; 7:5
 - b. A Biblical understanding of evangelism is critical to defining and achieving true success in it.

I. Church Work and Church Growth

A. Jesus is Looking for the Few

- 1. What is our role in evangelism? Are we charged with teaching and converting the lost?
 - a) Jesus sent His disciples into the world to preach the gospel. Mk. 16:15-16; Mt. 28:18-20
 - b) This command is extended to as many new disciples as are taught the way of Christ.
- 2. It is evident, however, that teaching the gospel and converting sinners are two different matters.
 - a) Few will respond favorably to God's teaching and be saved. Mt. 7:13-14; 13:18-23
 - b) Even Jesus was rejected far more often than He was received. Jn. 1:11-13
- 3. Jesus is not interested in numbers; He is looking for genuine faith. Jn. 2:23-25; 6:60-69
 - a) Despite His love, He understands such faith is only found in the minority of men.
 - b) Jesus is looking for the few who are fit for His kingdom the committed, not casual.

B. Our Task in Evangelism

- 1. How would you feel if a preacher said, "Go teach your neighbors, but none of them will obey"?
 - a) That was the charge God gave to the prophet Ezekiel. Eze. 2:1-7; 3:4-9
 - b) Noah preached for a hundred or more years, but only his family joined him on the ark.
- 2. Though our task may not be quite as grim, we may feel little hope of success in evangelism.
 - a) How can we feel inspired to teach others when so few will study and even fewer obey?
 - b) Our solution may be to do nothing and dismiss our duty because of the obstacles to success!
- 3. The sower's work was to broadcast the seed, literally fling it that it might find good ground.
 - a) He knew much of it would be wasted or lost, but he trusted the Lord for a sufficient harvest.
 - b) Our task in evangelism is to plant and water the seed; God gives the growth. 1Co. 3:5-7

C. Defining Success

- 1. We will grow as a congregation of God's people if we do the work God has assigned.
 - a) Our job is not to convert others; our job is not even to set up Bible studies with unbelievers.
 - b) Our task is to sow the seed whenever and wherever we may be able. Ac. 17:17; 20:20-21
- 2. God is not looking for numbers; He seeks kingdom people. Ac. 18:9-11; Ro. 2:28-29
 - a) Philadelphia only had a little strength, but they were commended by Christ. Re. 3:8
 - b) Wealthier and established churches like Laodicea and Sardis were rebuked. Re. 3:1, 15-16
- 3. We can be confident that we will grow if we do our part in seeking the lost.
 - a) Speaking the word helps us grow stronger and develop the qualities God is seeking.
 - b) Numerical growth may result, but there will certainly be spiritual advancement.
- 4. How should we measure evangelistic success?
 - a) Christ does not appoint preachers to baptize; He appoints preachers to preach! 1Co. 1:17
 - b) The question is not "Are we growing numerically?" It is "Are we working?" Eph. 4:11-16

D. Addition by Subtraction

- 1. God's people sometimes grow stronger even while becoming smaller.
 - a) Was the church better for having a man like Diotrephes in it? 3Jn. 9-10
 - b) Was Thyatira stronger for having a member like Jezebel? Re. 2:20
- 2. Christ values the quality of disciples more than the quantity. Ro. 16:17-18
 - a) Professions of faith and religious activity will not be enough to save anyone. Mt. 7:21-23
 - b) Jesus is looking for those who will accept the demands of discipleship. Lk. 14:26-35

E. Why Teach If No One Wants To Hear?

- 1. What is the purpose of evangelism when no one is willing to listen or respond?
 - a) It affirms the sovereignty and priority of God in the world. Da. 5:17-23; Mt. 28:18-19
 - b) It affirms the authority and validity of God's word. Eze. 2:4-5
 - c) It brings the opportunity of salvation to those who are willing and receptive. 1Ti. 2:3-4
 - d) It glorifies God in the condemnation of the wicked that reject His way. He. 11:7
- 2. Noah, Elijah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel fulfilled their mission, even if they made few converts.
 - a) God's word will accomplish the purpose for which it is sent. Is. 55:10-11
 - b) God's word is a message of both salvation and condemnation.

II. What is Our Motive in Evangelism?

A. Carnal Motives in Teaching

- 1. Sadly, many church growth approaches focus almost entirely on numbers.
 - a) Though they may say numbers are not important, it quickly becomes apparent that they are!
 - b) Some may even think that a lack of baptisms is equivalent to a lack of effort or faithfulness.
- 2. The danger in being numbers-oriented is that you can eventually seek it at any cost.
 - a) If numerical growth is the priority, one can begin to embrace whatever makes it happen.
 - b) Thus doctrines that obstruct numerical growth become less important. (e.g. MDR)

B. Incomplete Motives in Teaching

- 1. As previously noted, there is more to declaring God's truth than just saving souls.
 - a) Like discipline, evangelism serves multiple purposes in the plan of God.
 - b) God desires all men to be saved, but He recognizes that the word drives some men away!
- 2. If saving souls is our only motive in teaching the lost, we can be easily discouraged and quit.
 - a) What would men like Noah or Ezekiel have done if saving souls was all that mattered?
 - b) We must realize that some men do not want to be saved.
 - c) We also must realize that our success does not depend on anyone accepting the gospel.

C. The Spiritual Motive in Teaching

- 1. Our primary motive in teaching God's word ought to be to serve His purposes and glorify Him.
 - a) Yes, we want souls to be saved, and we rightly work and pray and plead for it to be so.
 - b) But we also appreciate the value and purpose of teaching even when no one obeys.
- 2. It is this God-toward focus in our ministry that can help us continue on when times are tough.
