<u>The Final Stages of Israel's Apostasy</u> Lesson 4 - A Worship that left the Heart Untouched <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

Introduction: There is a well defined path for a people to forget God.

- A. There is an age old battle about the nature of worship. Will it be God-centered or mancentered? (Jer 25:6-7)
 - 1. The essence of the battle can be defined by the battle between flesh and spirit. (Rom 8:5-8)
 - 2. Worldly people will have certain tastes and spiritual people will be different!
 - 3. Worldly people like worldly ways and worldly wisdom. (1 Jn 4:5-6)
- B. A sure sign of a falling away from God is when worship becomes centered upon man's flesh (desires).
 - 1. The idol worship of Jeremiah's day was popular, considered modern and intelligent and would easily keeps one's attention.
 - 2. What it spectacularly failed to do was impact the heart for the true God.

I. Worship must come from a reverence for God and His word

- A. What is worship? (Jn 4:23-24)
 - προσκυνέω proskuneo (Verb) from a basic sense bow down to kiss someone's feet, garment hem, or the ground in front of him; (2) in the NT of worship or veneration of a divine or supposedly divine object, expressed concretely with falling face down in front of someone worship, venerate, do obeisance to; - Friberg Dictionary
 - 2. God is the audience and to Him worship must be found to be acceptable. (Lev 2:2; Mal 1:9)
 - 3. God's desire is to have a people that <u>"cling" to Him</u> for "renown, praise and glory." (Jer 13:10-11)
- B. Worship must be based on an acceptable relationship with Him.
 - 1. It is the people that ultimately God finds acceptable. (Ezk 20:40-41)
 - 2. If the heart is untouched then the worship is vain. (Mt 15:8-9)
 - 3. Do worldly men desire a worship that challenges them to change?
- C. Without reverence for God worship becomes boring and "traditional" and must be changed. (Mal 1:13)
 - 1. Israel changed worship by making their nationality and the place of the temple the key for acceptable worship. (Jer 7:2-7)
 - 2. That was a lot easier than "amending your ways."

II. Worship must pierce and challenge man's rebellious heart

- A. Since the purpose of worship is to place ourselves before God, then that act will cause our hearts to be exposed. (1 Cor 14:24-25)
 - 1. True worship is both painful and joyful.
 - 2. Worship helps us see the unseen and put life in its proper place. (Ps 73:16-17)

- B. Worship cannot take place unless the ear is open to God's word. (Jer 26:1-6)
 - 1. "Do not diminish a word." Respect for the word of God is key.
 - 2. Basic reverence for God causes us to stand <u>only</u> in what He teaches.
 - 3. Consider what Jesus taught about handling God's word. (Mt 4:4; Jn 5:19; 8:28)
 - 4. It is basic reverence to God that we do nothing when God's word is silent!
 - 5. In both Old and New Testament worship had to be chosen (authorized) by God.
- C. How did Jehoiakim, king of Judah, react? (Jer 26:20-24)
 - 1. He hated anyone who showed him his heart.
 - 2. With great zeal he hunted down and killed one faithful prophet. He especially wanted to kill Jeremiah.
 - 3. God gave Jehoiakim His word in a scroll. (Jer 36:1-3, 20-25)
 - 4. The people reacted like their leaders. (Jer 11:19-21)

III. Israel's substitutes for worship

- A. Loving and emotional experience. (Ezk 8:13-16)
 - 1. Emotional religion that blocks out the rebuke of God's word and appeals to the emotions is what Israel loved.
 - 2. Emotions often are produced apart from reason.
- B. Loving an able speaker. (Ezk 33:30-33)
 - 1. There is nothing wrong with eloquence.
 - 2. How many today love men who speak but their hearts are unchanged from the message?
- C. Loving false prophets that spoke "their language." (Jer 8:8-9)
- D. Assuming they already knew what God wanted. (Jer 42:1-6)
 - 1. Men in their pride commonly assume they already know what God wants.
 - 2. What was the reaction of these flattering men when they heard a message that they did not want to hear? (Jer 43:1-2)

IV. God's appeal to Israel for acceptable worship

- A. The message is simple and powerful. (Jer 5:19-31)
 - 1. Fear God and listen to Him.
 - 2. Repent of your sin and become right with God.
 - 3. Treat your fellow man with love and service.
- B. What's in your heart? Is your worship acceptable?
 - 1. They did not listen to their "own hurt." (Jer 25:3-8)
 - 2. Worship is the path to seeing God and being molded into His image.

- 2. What is worship? How does reverence for God direct our worship?
- 3. What are the keys to identifying acceptable worship?
- 4. What substitutes did Israel make for worship? How do men today make substitutes?
