Moral Issues of Our Time Lesson 2 – Attitudes Towards Others – Pride, Bitterness and Dishonesty www.aubeacon.com

Introduction: How we view, think of and treat others reveals our relationship with God!

- A. Consider the enormity of Jesus' acknowledgment of this truth. (Mt 22:37-40)
 - 1. Why is it important to "love your neighbor as yourself?"
 - 2. This is very hard. We must have a <u>constantly tender, teachable heart</u>. (Isa 64:8; Rom 8:29)
- B. Satan's most effective tool has been his use of relationships.
 - 1. Most of those who fall away will <u>cite relationships as the reason!</u> You will hear: "Brethren mistreated me" but never "Jesus mistreated me!" (Rom 3:4)
 - 2. Satan is merciless and cruel. His disciples are *quick to judge and "throw away" people*. When you let bitterness into your heart Satan wins! **(Heb 12:15)**

I. Are we pride centered or God centered?

- A. Pride is one of the *main avenues for temptation*. (1 Jn 2:15-17)
 - 1. How do <u>we see ourselves</u>? We cannot be a Christian without a grateful heart that has been broken and healed. (Mt 5:3-4)
 - 2. Those that do not have this security often *make up for it in pride*!
- B. In pride we become *the flawless center of own universe*. (Jer 17:9-10)
 - 1. In the world we are given allowances while others are judged without mercy.
 - 2. In the world we want others to understand us but <u>we do not lift a finger</u> to understand others.
 - 3. In the world we will <u>hold grudges and seek revenge</u>. We will trust no one but ourselves. (Titus 3:3)
- C. Jesus challenges us to think about our actions towards others. (Mt 7:12)
 - 1. This way of thinking is found in the Old Testament. (Ex 22:21, 23:9)
 - 2. How we *handle and remember our hurts* is crucial to how we treat others.
 - 3. We must resist being pulled into <u>an unjust and unmerciful mindset</u>. It is poisonous and a form of hatred. (1 Jn 3:15; Lev 19:18)
 - 4. From these thoughts you will likely give in to mistreatment of others. You will not hesitate to take from those you hate! (Lev 19:34-37)

II. Three key components of Satan's wisdom (Jas 3:14)

- A. Bitterness towards brethren. (Heb 12:15; Gal 5:19-21)
 - 1. We must develop a heart that can receive rebuke and correction. It is very easy to be angry *especially when we are in the wrong!*
 - 2. Rather than study a matter it is easy to say "this is a church of Christ tradition." This first step can lead to rejecting many more truths! (Deut 29:18-19)
 - 3. You become poison! If you stay like this *it is just a matter of time* before you leave "sectarian brethren" and take others with you. (**Prov 14:10**)
 - 4. Please do not closely associate with an angry man. (Prov 22:24-25)

B. Pride towards brethren

1. Pride and bitterness are common partners. (Lk 18:9)

- 2. Pride can allow men to artificially build themselves up. Many <u>look down on</u> <u>their "ignorant" brethren</u>. (Jn 7:47-49; 1 Cor 8:1-3)
- 3. Pride rejoices in the faults of others. You live in the land of "throw-away" people. You write them off with no attempt to work with them.
- 4. They discuss the faults of brethren to build themselves up. (2 Cor 10:12, 18)
- 5. Ridicule and derision of others is freely shared. (Ex. Creed Rehearsal, Hatfield's and McCoy's churches of Christ)

C. A learned dishonesty. (Lk 20:4-7)

- 1. This creates a heart that *cannot receive the word of God*. (Lk 8:15 KJV)
- 2. Men of faith and conviction are <u>open and bold</u>. (2 Cor 4:2; 3:2; Jn 1:47)
- 3. One brother described a man's preaching as "veiled subtleties that leave you uneasy after hearing the sermons."
- 4. They are <u>always "misunderstood</u>" and love to wear martyr's clothes. (Quote)
- 5. <u>How did Jesus teach others</u>? Why do men hide their beliefs? (Jn 18:20)

III. How can we have a heart of justice and mercy towards others?

- A. We must major on seeing our forgiveness towards God. (Jam 2:13; 2 Pt 1:8-11)
 - 1. When we do this we will be reminded of our own need of mercy and rejoice!
 - 2. We will love mercy and want to reflect God's character. We will reach out!
 - 3. Without this we will become isolated and suspicious of our brethren.
- B. I need to honestly *test my own heart*. Consider these questions:
 - 1. Am I often *dominated by critical thoughts* towards my brethren?
 - 2. Are there people *I avoid or withhold a "thank you"* or encouragement?
 - 3. Do I often think of a "me versus them" situation among brethren? (1 Sam 22:8)
 - 4. Am I spending *more time with people of the world* than with Christians?
 - 5. Am I *quick to be hurt* by questionable actions of others or am I *quick to make allowances* for others? (1 Cor 13:7; Lk 23:34)
- C. What does God want me to think of my brethren? (Rom 14:19; 15:1-2)
 - 1. We must always be glad and actively seek to encourage every brother.
 - 2. I should go out of my way to help those that I may struggle with!
 - 3. When I really learn the love of God I will be *glad to be with my brethren*! I will speak well of them and heartily greet them! **(Eph 4:1-2)**
 - 4. True spiritual growth will be seen here. How are we doing?
