tice of my faith and the church, I am

resistant to change. If that makes me an old moss back or one stuck in the mud, so be it. The fact that we have "always done it" doesn't affect me in the least – if the way we have always done is right. Quite frankly, I spend very little time sitting around trying to think up something new to try. Why? First, "the faith" was once for all time delivered to the saints in the First Century (Jude 3). So, anything that is a part of "the faith" should not be changed. It must remain as it was in the back then. The spiritual needs of man have not changed with time, nor does the way to meet those needs change. God's way of saving men or making men righteous must remain as it has been for over 2.000 years. > 4. Does this present any real danger of being a precursor to other changes that we would not want to see made. Sometimes efforts to "tweak" things a bit results in overtweaking and breaking it. There is a lot to be said for "if it ain't broke, don't fix it.

> 5. Is this proposed change being made to better please God and honor Him more, or is it more about you – just to satisfy your desire to change and "get out of a rut?" It may be that the problem that got you "in a rut" is not how things are being done, but you have allowed your mind to get "out of the groove" of worshiping and serving God with your all – might, heart, mind and soul – using the expedients already in place.

> So, if I am to endorse one's proposed change or innovation he needs to give good solid reasons for my doing so. I admit that I like my comfort zone and am reluctant to have it disturbed unnecessarily. Yet. I hope that I am not so wed to that zone that I will not leave it even when solid evidence is given that I should. Nor do I mind having it challenged. I recognize that in this area of expediency that being neither "new" nor "old" of itself makes a thing either right or wrong. But, constant efforts to get me to blindly favor this or that new unproven "fad" will not likely get me excited in a positive way.

R. W. Officer: "Suppose I Have No Interpretation of the Bible on any Subject"

Robert Wallace Officer (1845-1930), at one point in his life, served as a missionary for the Liberty Baptist Association. During this six year period, he faced several charges of heresy. Below is an excerpt from a heresy trial in which Dr. J.R. Graves examined him to determine his "soundness of faith."

Graves: "But what will you do with what Paul says in his letter to the Galatians: 'Ye are all

the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus?' (Gal. 3:26.)"

Officer: "I will do with that just what I have done with the rest of that sentence—viz., believe it. It reads: 'For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ.' (Gal. 3:27.)"

Graves: "But what does that mean?"

Officer: "It means what it says."

Graves: "What do you believe are the conditions of pardon or remission of sins?"

Officer: "I believe just what the Bible says on that subject."

Graves: "But what is your interpretation of the Bible on that subject?"

Officer: "Suppose I have no interpretation of the Bible on any subject."

Graves: "But you have; all denominations have their interpretations of the Bible. We, as Baptists, teach that repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ secure pardon. What do you think about it?"

Officer: "The Bible says: 'Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God.' (John 3:5.) 'He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved.' (Mark 16:16.) To believers, Peter said: 'Repent, and be baptized . . . for the remission of sins.' (**Acts** 2:38.)"

Graves: "We all believe the Bible as strong as you do. Tell us what your interpretation of the texts you have quoted is. This is what we want to get at."

Officer: "My interpretation is exactly what I have quoted; in other words, I have no interpretation of it. I simply believe

it, just as it is written." (R.W. Officer – Heresy Trial)

Graves stated that "all denominations have their interpretations of the Bible" – this is certainly true. The apostle Paul said, "God is not the author of confusion" **(1 Corinthians 14:33)**. Yet the churches of men have many different and conflicting doctrines. Such confusion is of men, not of God. Denominations are founded upon the commands and opinions of fallible human beings.

R.W. Officer claimed to "have no interpretation of the Bible on any subject." Instead of twisting the Scriptures as the denominations did, he said, "I simply believe it, just as it is written."

God has revealed His word in a way that will allow us to understand it (Ephesians 3:4). Rather than twist the Scriptures (2 Peter 3:16) to try to make them say what we want them to say, let us resolve to simply accept the word of God as it has been revealed in truth.
