And Peter Remembered The Word of Jesus

The poignant words that serve as our title were taken from Matthew

26:75. They are found in a passage that will serve to recall the situation to the mind's eye. "And Peter remembered the word of Jesus, which said unto him. before the cock crow, thou shalt denv me thrice. And he went out and wept bitterly." Doubtless the great fisherman apostle never forgot that moment. Tears and time did not erase the agony and remorse of the regretful event.

Perhaps there is no connection; it may be but a coincidence of Scripture, if there be any such thing, but in the second epistle by the same apostle we find the repetition of the word "remembrance." "Wherefore I will not be negligent to put you always in remembrance of these things, though ye know them, and be established in the present truth. Yea, I think it meet, as long as I am in this tabernacle, to stir you up by putting you in remembrance.... Moreover I will endeavor that ye may be able after my decease to have these things always in remembrance" (2 Pet. 1:12-15). "This second epis-

tle, beloved, I now write unto you; in both which I stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance: That ye may be mind-

ful" (2 Pet. 3:1, 2). Peter once forgot the word of Jesus. It came crashing to his remembrance in a painful manner. When the Lord looked at him after that rooster crowed the third time, it pierced his heart, "and he went out, and wept bitterly."

Could it be that Peter wanted no one to endure the thing that haunted him? He knew what it meant to be reminded of the words of Jesus. He understood the way of sin when the word of Jesus is forgotten. Therefore, he was not negligent to put the brethren "always in remembrance" of the word of God as delivered by the apostles and prophets. It is an engaging and intriguing thought. But regardless of whether or not that was the compelling idea behind Peter's words, let us not fail to do as he urged, that is, remember the word of Christ. "Thy word have I hid in my heart, that I might not sin against thee" (Psa. 119: 11).

Silence is sometimes the best response. Once we have had time to reflect, however, we usually can find important lessons

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to capture in words what they

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that will be embedded in our minds from then on. If we can learn those lessons, then we can be the better for it.

When the Twin Towers in New York City were taken down by terrorists, people were in shock. It was an unbelievable event. Nearly three thousands lives were taken in one day, and the heart of the United States country was struck hard. What were we going to demonstrate that we were made of? For a time, there was a pulling together of the citizens. More importantly, there was a general recognition of the need to turn to God. Sadly, much of that faded over the years, but this is why we need to be reminded of difficult events and the lessons that come out of them.

When tragedy strikes, we are forced to consider several important issues:

1. Why? It is not trite to say that sin has caused the tragic problems of this world. Once sin came into this world, everything changed. Everything became subject to futility (**Rom 8:20**). The mark left by sin is tragic and ugly. This is the reason the gospel is such an important part of our understanding.

2. The Relative Value of Material stuff. What does it profit us if we gain the whole world and lose our souls? (Matt 16:24-27) Losing stuff isn't as much a problem when we put it into perspective.

3. The Value of Loved Ones. People are always more important than things. When tragedy strikes, we look for the people we love first. This is as it should be.

4. The Value of Time. Tragedy will force us to prioritize our time, reconsider how we are using it, and try to use it wisely from then on **(Eph. 5:15-17)**. 5. Our Relationship with God. Must we be reminded that there is no more important relationship than that with God? Will we use tragic events as an excuse to run from God, or will we use them to draw closer to Him? (Psalm 73)

6. The Importance of Eternity. What we can see is temporary; what we cannot see is eternal. Therefore, we must look to the eternal and recognize that our real goal is to please God because one day we will be brought to judgment **(2 Cor. 4:16-5:10)**.

7. Our Perspective on Everything. How will we react to difficult times? What will say to others? What will we do to cope? Will we pray? Will we meditate on God's word? Or will we be anxious, worried, and troubled? See what Jesus says about worry and anxiety in **Matthew 6:24-33**. How much we are wiling to trust God speaks volumes about how we deal with matters that cause anxiety. That may be "easier said than done," but it is the perspective we are taught to embrace.

Terrorism. Natural disasters. Crimes. Heartaches at every turn. What does it take to wake us up and make sure that we are right with God?

Tell your family that you love them. Quit the quibbling and fighting. Who cares who started what? Let's get over ourselves and seek the welfare of one another. Let us humble ourselves before God and make sure that our priorities are where they should be.

"Therefore if you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth. For you have died and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, is revealed, then you also will be revealed with Him in glory" **(Col. 3:1-4).**

Some Marks Of God's People

Malachi 3:16 reads, "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name." In this text there are three characteristics given concerning the people of God that I want us to study, and then we will observe the blessing that followed. There are great lessons in this text for all of God's people today.

In the first place it says that they "feared the Lord." This in and of itself does not make one a child of God. It is said of Cornelius that he "feared God with all his house ... " (Acts 10:2) and that he was "a just man and one that feareth God .. " (verse 22). At the time, Cornelius was not a Christian, and he had to obey the Gospel in order to become a child of God. The kind of fear under consideration is not a fear that causes one to shudder at the very thought of God, but it is a reverential awe and respect for God and His will. In speaking of God David wrote, "He sent redemption unto his people: he hath commanded his covenant forever: holv and reverend is his name" (Psa. 111:9). The writer of the Hebrew letter said that we are to "serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear" (Heb. 12:28). It is evident that most people have little or no respect for God or His Word. According to Solomon, the whole duty of man is to "Fear God and keep his commandments" (Eccl. 12:13). Peter made this statement at the house of Cornelius,"...Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons: But in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him" (Acts 10:34 -35). There is no way that one can be a faithful child of God if he has no reverence and respect for God and His will.

Secondly, it is said in our text that these people of God "spake often one to another." This implies that they had fellowship one with another, that they cooperated one with the other, that they were mutually helpful to each other. The word fellowship carries with it the idea of joint participation. We are told, "And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works" (Heb. 10:24). Paul wrote that we are "workers together with him..." 2 Cor. 6:1) and that "we are laborers together with God" (1 Cor. 3:9). The Psalmist wrote, "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" (Psa. 133:1). Some things might be pleasant that are not good for us, and some things might be good for us that are not pleasant, but unity is both good and pleasant. Christians are to "Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honor preferring one another" (**Rom. 12:10**). Paul wrote, "Fulfil ye my joy, that ye be likeminded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind. Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." (**Phil. 2:2-3**). Love for one another lets the world know that we belong to Christ (John 13:34-35). The early church certainly fit this pattern (Acts 2:44-45; 4:34-37).

Thirdly, it is said of God's people that they "thought upon his name." This implies that they meditated upon God and His will, and that they were devout worshipers of Him. Do you enjoy studying God's Word, and are you a faithful worshiper of God? The "Blessed" man of Psalms chapter 1, is one whose "delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his Law doth he meditate day and night." Paul wrote, "Study to shew thyself approved of God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). What do you think about most? We are products of our thinking (Prov. 23:7; Rom. 12:1-2). We cannot rise above our thinking!

Finally, notice the results of the preceding, "and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them ... " Rest assured that God does not forget His people. Paul spoke of people "whose names are written in the book of life" (Phil. 4:3). We need to remember that God has said. "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee" (Heb. 13:5). Because of that promise we can "boldly say. The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me" (verse 6). Rest assured "our labor is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58). "For God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which ye have showed toward his name, in that ye have ministered to the saints, and do minister" (Heb. 6:10). Do we really believe these promises? I hope that we do, because God cannot lie (Tit. 1:2; Heb. 6:18). May we strive to have the characteristics that we have discussed in our lives, and heaven will someday be our eternal home.
