Esau -- The Power of Obsession

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Introduction: What is the value of character?

- A. The root idea of character is that of moral strength and courage. (Rom 5:3-5)
 - 1. Character here means: "approved, tried character; a proof, a specimen of tried worth."
 - 2. Men of faith develop this strength to stand when the strong desires within us beckon to another path. (Heb 11:24-25)
- B. Many Christians however are overconfident and blind as to their true character.
 - 1. Paul knew the possibility of this overconfidence. (2 Cor 13:5; 1 Cor 10:12)
 - 2. The reason men stand is because of preparation in the word of God. (Psa 119:11)
 - 3. It is sad to see how quickly some Christians fall and their "reasons" for this action. Many have viewed themselves as strong! Esau is such a Bible character.

I. The Advantages of Esau

A. He had Godly parents, Isaac and Rebekah. (Gen 26:21)

- 1. Isaac was the beloved son of Abraham!
- 2. God identified Himself to Moses as being the God of Isaac! (Acts 7:31-32)
- 3. Unfortunately both Isaac and Rebekah became divided and showed favoritism. (Gen 25:28)
 - a. This division had terrible consequences. Parents need unity to give the greatest strength of character to a child! (Ex. Advice in marriage class)
 - b. This later led to deceit, bitterness and separation.

B. He was the firstborn.

- 1. In other words he had the "birthright".
 - a. This meant a double share of the inheritance and first place among the sons.
 - b. Because he was a direct descendant of Abraham a major spiritual blessing was involved. He knew of the exalted place he occupied. (Gen 12:1-3)
- 2. God had blessed Esau greatly.
 - a. God's prophecy of Isaac and Esau was of their descendants. (Rom 9:11-13; Gen 25:23)
 - b. No man can blame God for their failures! (Jas 1:13)

II The Obsession of Esau

- A. Esau made a choice based upon a temporary obsession. (Gen 25:29-34)
 - 1. There are two ways of thinking and making decisions. (Rom 8:5-6)
 - 2. Because of Esau's carnal mind he "despised" that which was truly valuable.
 - 3. When we treat God's things lightly we despise it. (1 Cor 11:22)
- B. Characteristics of obsession.
 - 1. **Obsession:** "1. Compulsive preoccupation with a fixed idea or an unwanted feeling or emotion, often accompanied by symptoms of anxiety. 2. A compulsive, often unreasonable idea or emotion."

2. Obsession has its own reality. (Gen 25:32)

- a. Was Esau about to die? NO!
- b. The strong desire for something causes one to believe a lie.
- c. Reason has little value, the goal is to obtain the thing desired not to see and

- stand upon the truth. (Ex. The desire for a mate.)
- d. This is the driving force behind most false teachers. God described Balaam as "mad". (2 Peter 2:15-16; Jude 11)
- e. If you want something bad enough, God will give it to you! (2 Thess 2:11-12)
- f. How many Christians have I seen give up heaven for an obsession!
- 3. Obsession has no concept of waiting. (Gen 25:34)
 - a. Why wait for something? Wisdom knows why. (Isa 40:31; Hosea 12:6)
 - b. What are the dangers of rushing? You may leave God out!
- 4. Obsession will pay any price.
 - a. Salesmen love to create obsession in their customers. Why?
 - b. When reason departs men close their eyes. What will they think later when they look back?
- 5. Obsession is powerful.
 - a. The power is found in our lusts. (1 Pt 2:11; 1 Tim 6:9)
 - b. Too many of our young think they will not be affected. (2 Tim 2:22; Rom 1:24)
 - c. All false teaching has this "power" as its drawing power. (Eph 4:22; Jude 16)
 - d. If you deny this point ask an alcoholic or drug addict.
- 6. Obsession cannot see the future and its consequences. (Heb 12:16-17)
 - a. Satan wants you to be deceived. (Eph 4:22)
 - b. The great value of the gospel is that it is true. (Psa 1:3-5)
 - c. While Esau's obsession was temporary, could Esau change the past?
 - d. Sadly Esau continued in bad decisions because he was a "profane" person. (Gen 27:41)

III. Obsessions of Our Generation

- A. The Sexual Desire (Heb 13:4; 1 Cor 6:18)
- B. The Need for a Mate (Mark 6:17)
- C. The desire for Material Things. (1 Tim 6:9-10)
- D. The desire for Revenge. (Rom 12:19-21; Eph 4:31-32; Heb 12:15)
- E. The Desire for Alcohol and Drugs. (Prov 23:32-35)
- F. The Desire for Attention.

IV. How to Overcome Obsession

- A. Build a Character that pleases God. (Heb 11:17)
 - 1. Why does a person attend all the services, principle or ease?
 - 2. When obsession comes, you will find out what a person is made of.
- B. Keep Thinking. (1 Thess 5:21-22)
- C. Have friends who will tell you what you need, not what you want! (2 Tim 4:24)
- D. Maintain proper worship. (Psa 73:12-17)
- E. Go to Spiritual men for advice. (John 3:19-21)
 - 1. A spiritual person wants to be tested. What if Esau had first talked with Isaac?
 - 2. There is a difference in the advice of the worldly and the spiritual.
- Conclusion: Who do you want in control of your life, God or Satan?
 - A. Esau found out the bitterness Satan brings into one's life. (Gen 27:38)
 - B. Prepare your heart today to meet the time of obsession. (1 Cor 10:13)
