When a Christian Stops Attending

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Introduction: A Christian who neglects his faith will in time show it.

- A. A neglected faith will in time face a "moment of truth."
 - 1. It may be a time of persecution. (**Lk 8:13; Mt 24:11-13**)
 - 2. It may be a period of drifting and "small" compromises. (Lk 8:14; Heb 2:1)
 - 3. Many never see the fall coming, but they should have!
- B. One of the warnings concerning a compromised faith is how one attends the assemblies of the church.
 - 1. When ones heart loses interest in the Lord he will naturally lose interest in the things of the Lord. (Mk 8:33-37)
 - 2. It is very possible for someone to depart from the Lord and still attend services!
 - 3. After I baptize someone I try to impress upon them the importance of attending every service. (Jas 2:17-18)
 - 4. Let us learn about proper attitudes towards the Lord and the assemblies of the saints.

I. He shows a disregard for his own soul

- A. One of Satan's best weapons is to make us indifferent to urgent matters. (2 Cor 4:3-4)
 - 1. Sin can mess-up our thinking. We can do that which we know is wrong and in time try to justify it.
 - 2. We can partake of the wisdom of this world and arrogantly defy God Himself! (Acts 5:38-40; 2 Pt 3:3-4)
 - 3. Are you willingly to listen to God and follow His will? Be careful, you may be claiming to follow God while in fact be fighting Him. (Phil 3:18-19)
- B. The assemblies of the church are God's arrangement for our good.
 - 1. Why does God give instructions for the assemblies? (**Heb 10:23-25**)
 - 2. It is the height of arrogance to see a God-given provision and claim that you do not need it.

II. He shows a disregard for other Christians

- A. I have never seen one forsake the assemblies of the church that first did not pull away from other Christians and become indifferent to their needs.
 - 1. What did Jesus say would characterize His followers? (Jn 13:34-35)
 - 2. This must involve becoming a part of the lives of others both within and without the services. (Acts 9:26-28; Acts 1:21)
 - 3. Many have accepted a sterile, self-centered view of the life of a Christian. It is no wonder why they dried up and failed.
- B. Consider the involvement I am to have in the lives of other Christians.
 - 1. I am to know and care for my brethren. (1 Cor 12:23-25)
 - 2. I am to genuinely greet them and seek their association. (1 Cor 16:20;

2 Cor 13:12; Rom 12:16; Acts 2:42-47)

- a.In this I am not to play favorites. (Rom 15:5-7; Jas 2:2-3)
- b. Are you playing favorites at this church? How long has it taken for you to greet and get to know our new members?

- 3. I am to correct and instruct them. (Rom 15:14; 1 Thess 5:11; Heb 3:13)
- 4. I must see my need for my brethren. (Rom 12:5)
- 5. I am to love my brethren and become their servant. (Rom 12:10; Gal 5:13; Eph 4:2)
 - a. Are you really patient in love with your brethren?
 - b. What do our tongues reveal about our hearts? Watch out for those "experts" who strongly criticize from a distance but never have lifted a finger to be involved and help the one criticized.
 - c. This is a critical spirit is commonly found among those who quit attending. Who taught them this spirit?
- C. When I pull back from attending I discourage those who are working.
 - 1. It is a great encouragement to see those who are faithful. (3 Jn 4)
 - 2. How discouraging it is to see Christians throw it all away. (Phil 3:18)
 - 3. Often we pull back in steps. First one pulls back from things such as business meetings, teaching classes, helping with other duties. Next comes Wednesday and then Sunday Bible classes.
 - 4. When we pull back in any of these things we discourage! Some do it to accomplish that very thing! It is a childish punishment. (Num 32:6-7)

III. He shows a disregard for God

- A. One of the more unusual examples of warped thinking is seen by the "reasoning" of the one who has stopped attending.
 - 1. Most I have talked with will claim to still be serving God.
 - 2. How can you be serving God and be walking in flagrant disobedience? (1 Jn 2:3-5)
 - 3. Some of Satan's best workers claim to know God. (Jn 16:1-3)
 - 4. Before we can repent we need to see clearly what we have done. Satan tries to minimize it but appealing to the world. (Ex. "Why have you quit the Lord?")
- B. He has show an unwillingness to have God in his knowledge.
 - 1. What happens when we do not worship? (Rom 1:21-22; 1 Cor 11:29-31)
 - 2. Those who quit attending are in fact running from God.

IV. He has made a choice for his eternal destiny

- A. Those who go to heaven go there on purpose. (Rev 2:7,11; 3:19-21)
 - 1. What must we "overcome?"
 - 2. Many have a flawed view of the Christian life. It is a war! If we were in a real war would you come to "training camp?"
- B. We show where our hearts are by the "small choices."
 - 1. We must make the commitment to attend all the services when we are baptized the same way a man commits to his wife in marriage!
 - 2. You should not have to decide to attend when each service comes around.
 - 3. Do you want to go to heaven? (Lk 13:25-30)

Conclusion: Where is your heart?

- A. If you have fallen short, repent and gain wisdom to overcome! (Rev 21:7-8)
- B. There are Christians here today that can help you! Will you let them?
