Were You There When They Crucified My Lord? <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

Introduction: The Cross of Christ has a way of exposing men to their true nature.

- A. Paul spoke of the difference between those who are "committed" to the cross and those who are occasionally "contributors". (Gal 5:11; 6:12, 14)
 - 1. The cross of Christ by its nature demands a complete change in men. ' (Lk 9:23-24)
 - 2. Christianity by its very nature is "radical", anything less falls short.
 - 3. Those who side with the Lord only when they agree are "ashamed of the cross of Christ".
- B. The events surrounding the cross show us certain men and women who learned the difference between who they thought they were and who they really are.
 - 1. Those who are exposed to the word of God with a tender heart will "know themselves". (Heb 4:12-13)
 - Sadly, it is common for men to think they have this service but inwardly they have "disconnected" themselves from a honest look at themselves.
 (2 Cor 13:5)
 - 3. The events of the cross brought several face to face with themselves.

I. The Betrayal of Judas

- A. I doubt Judas ever truly saw himself. He may have thought like others: "I am just weak, but I love God"
- B. There are several things he had done for the Lord.
 - 1. He had left home as a believer in Christ. (Lk 6:13, 16)
 - 2. He suffered the same things the disciples did.
 - 3. He heard Jesus teachings and taught many himself. (Matt 10:4-8)
- C. Judas had compromised his life while doing these good things.
 - 1. He was a thief. (Jn 12:6)
 - 2. No doubt he rationalized this sin. Sadly this sin left uncorrected would lead to much bigger things. (Mk 14:10-11, Gal 6:7-8)
 - 3. He likely held a false view of the kingdom as the apostles did at this time.
 - 4. Judas betrayed Jesus for money. It was not until Judas saw that Jesus was going to the cross that his overwhelming guilt caused him to commit suicide. (Matt 27:3-4)
 - 5. Why did he commit suicide? Did he not know the Lord would forgive? In the practice of his sin he had so weakened his faith that he could not see.
- D. Modern day Judas'
 - 1. Those who put physical things over spiritual (Matt 6:33; Col 3:5-6)
 - 2. Those that have a practice of personal sin with no responsibility. (Acts 24:16; 1 Jn 3:9)

II. The Denial of Peter

A. Peter was overconfident in that he never thought he would have to face this

occasion. (Matt 26:31-35)

- 1. He had showed this same reaction earlier. (Matt 16:21-23)
- 2. Perhaps his wrong view of the kingdom encouraged this view.
- 3. His overconfidence left him unprepared. (Matt 26:40-41)
- 4. Even though the Lord specifically warned him, he did the very thing he denied he would ever do. (Matt 26:56, 58, 69-75)
- B. Overconfident Peter's of our day. (1 Cor 10:12)
 - 1. Those who take it easy in Bible classes. (Or miss altogether)
 - 2. Those who are not striving to grow and take on responsibility.
 - 3. Those who ignore clear warnings of scripture. (1 Cor 15:33)

III. The Cowardice of Pilate

- A. Pilate probably thought of himself as a man of courage!
 - 1. After all he had tried to free Christ. (Jn 18:38, 39-40; 19:1-6)
 - 2. Pilate, like other cowards announced the truth but wanted others to take a stand first. He would not pay the price.
 - 3. He thought he could wash his hands after just saying what was right. (Matt 27:24)
 - 4. What was the truth about Pilate? (Acts 4:24-27)
- B. Who are the Pilates of today?
 - 1. Those who compromise out of peer pressure. (Ex. Modest dress, church attendance and family visits, stopping gossip)
 - 2. Those who will fellowship those in sin. (2 Jn 9-11) (Ex. These will not rebuke error and even will praise them in their religious sin.)

IV. The Perplexity of the Centurion

- A. The Centurion honestly saw the events and was troubled.
 - 1. He knew Jesus was an innocent man. How? By the actions of His accusers and the signs done. (Matt 27:39-43, 51-54)
 - 2. Even though he did not have the background of many there, he could see while many others could not. Why?
- B. We need to find and present the modern day centurions with the powerful evidence of the gospel of Christ. (Rom 1:16) (Ex. Cornelius)

V. The Steadfastness of Mary

- A. Mary never left her place and was with the Lord until the end. (Mt 27:55-56)
- B. We need the steadfast Marys of today who will stay at their posts no matter what. (1 Cor 15:58)

Conclusion: Were you there?

- A. In many ways we show the same heart of the people we have studied.
 - 1. Will you help crucify the Lord? (Heb 6:4-6)
 - 2. Will you stand with the Lord as thus show the glory of the cross of Christ. (Acts 5:41-42)
