Introduction: How do you show God given authority without bringing glory upon yourself?

- A. One of the problems with blessings is that the temptation of pride follows.
 - 1. Paul did not want to preach himself but Christ. (2 Cor 4:5)
 - 2. He did not want to glory except in the cross. (Gal 6:14)
- B. Those false apostles freely boasted in themselves and used flattery to gain a following.
 - 1. This approach left God out! (2 Cor 10:12, 17-18)
 - 2. When men followed these teachers, who were they following? (Jude 16-19)
 - 3. Paul continues to expose the folly of their claims.

I. The Visions of a "man in Christ" (12:1-6)

- A. Who is "the man in Christ?" (12:1-2)
 - 1. It was likely Paul speaking of himself in the third person.
 - 2. By doing this he avoids bringing attention to himself and exalting Christ.
- B. What is the "third heaven?"
 - 1. It is the abode of God in contrast to the first two heavens: 1. The atmosphere where the clouds gather. (Gen 2:1, 19); 2. The firmament containing the sun, moon and stars. (Mt 24:29)
 - 2. The glory of God would be so great to describe to man.
- C. What is "paradise?" (12:4)
 - 1. This may be a different place from the third heaven.
 - 2. This is described by Jesus to the thief. (Lk 23:43)
 - 3. This can also describe heaven. (Rev 2:7)
- D. Paul knew the danger of boasting. (12:6)
 - 1. Pride always leads to destruction. (Prov 16:18; 29:23)
 - 2. This is a danger in appointing an unqualified man to be an elder. (1 Tim 3:6)
 - 3. A man reveals his heart by his speech!

II. Paul's thorn in the flesh. (12:7-10)

- A. God uses Satan for His purposes and our good! (2 Cor 12:7)
 - 1. Satan often thought he was working against God, only to have God use his efforts for good. (Ex. The death of Christ) (1 Cor 2:6-8)
 - 2. Does God allow suffering through Satan to come upon His people? Yes. (Job 2:1-6)
- B. The good in Paul's suffering.
 - 1. It humbled him to pray. (Jas 5:13)
 - 2. It made him see the power and sufficiency of God's grace.
 - 3. It made him see the good in suffering so as to give God more praise!

- C. Are you strong in weakness? (12:10)
 - 1. It depends upon where your mind is focused. (1 Pt 1:13)
 - 2. Do you see how God's grace is in you and using you for a greater purpose?

III. The signs of an Apostle (12:11-13)

- A. It is almost funny to see these men try to claim superiority to the apostles!
 - 1. Paul remembered that in God's sight this was a gift and he was nothing.
 - 2. Paul did not look upon his God given abilities to lift himself up. (1 Cor 3:5-7)
- B. The apostles could do many things other Christians with spiritual gifts could not do.
 - 1. An apostle could confer gifts to others. (Acts 8:14-19)
 - 2. An apostle has authority from God. (2 Cor 10:14; 13:10)
 - 3. Boasters could be confident as long as an apostle was not around. These Corinthians could remember what they saw! (12:12)
- C. Paul did not allow this church the privilege of supporting him. (12:13)
 - 1. Others churches thought this was a blessing. (Phil 4:16-17; 2 Cor 8:5)
 - 2. Because of the attack upon Paul about money, he refused support!

IV. "For I do not seek yours, but you" (12:14-21)

- A. Paul was doing everything for the good of the Corinthians but was being disliked!
 - 1. Paul viewed them as a parent saw his child.
 - 2. Whose fault was it that Paul was not popular with some. (Gal 4:16)
- B. Paul saw their deceitful hearts through those men he sent to them. (12:19)
 - 1. False teachers like to work in the dark and make you think one thing and do another!
 - 2. Be careful with those who only want you to know thing in private!
- C. Paul would not let sin go by unnoticed. (12:20-21)
