### **Timothy**

*Introduction:* Jesus will mold us into useful instruments in His service.

- A. Our relationship Jesus has with us will mold us to be like Jesus. (Jn 15:11-17)
  - 1. Timothy was born in the Lycaonian city of Lystra. (Acts 16:1-3)
  - 2. His father was a Greek and his mother was a Jewess.
  - 3. Since Timothy was not circumcised then it is likely his father opposed it.
- B. He may have become acquainted with Paul and Barnabas when they came to Lystra around A.D. 46 to 48. (Acts 14:4-7)
  - 1. It is likely that Timothy, his mother and grandmother became Christians at this time. (Acts 16:1)
  - 2. Because of their Jewish background they were given an early opportunity to receive the gospel. (Rom 1:16-17)

### I. Jesus can mold the life of anyone who will come to Him

- A. From the world's perspective there was little potential in Timothy.
  - 1. He was a Jew in a distant Greek city.
  - 2. In his religious training only his mother and grandmother took a part. (2 Tim 1:5)
  - 3. There was great opposition from both the Jews and Greeks to Christians.
- B. God had planted His powerful word in Timothy's heart. (2 Tim 3:15; Acts 14:7-8)
  - 1. Over and over we see that it is not the background of an individual that matter but rather if one opens their heart to the Lord.
  - 2. Would you have sent a previously maddened, demon possessed man back to the people to teach having almost no knowledge? (Mk 5:1-5, 17-20; Lk 8:40)
  - 3. What made this man successful? How many of you have greater knowledge than this man?
  - 4. Again, would you use this woman in evangelism? (John 4:25-30)
  - 5. There is not a Christian among us who cannot be as effective as these if we would have the same measure of faith!

## II. The call to discipleship was clear to Timothy

- A. What would it have been like to witness the attempted execution of the one who just baptized you? (Acts 14:19)
  - 1. Here a fickle crowd who at first confessed to be Paul's supporter then is moved by some Jews to kill him.
  - 2. These Jews so hated Paul that they came from other cities following him. (Acts 14:1-6)
  - 3. Was this good or bad for Timothy? (2 Tim 3:10-12)
    - a. Paul reminds Timothy of these things for his good.
    - b. God wanted Israel to see opposition as well in Egypt. (Gen 46:32-24)
- B. When we attempt to water down the gospel for the comfort of others, we undermine God's power to mold a man! (2 Tim 4:1-4)
  - 1. Timothy decided to go preach with Paul. What did he think it would be like? (Acts 16:3)

- 2. They shortly came to Thessalonica. (Acts 17:1, 5-8)
- 3. What kind of faith was built within the Thessalonians? What kind of preaching and example did they see before them?
- 4. No one has become a Christian without repentance.
  - a. If Satan cannot stop us from believing the truth, he will settle for one being religious but unrepentant. (Jn 12:42-43)
  - b. We can be exposed to the truth all our lives and confess it, but be far away from the Lord in our hearts. (Mt 15:8-9)
- 5. Can one believe the truth and remain in a denomination without controversy?

# III. Timothy became like Jesus in his concern for others

- A. Timothy's faith grew from the start.
  - 1. He had a genuine faith that could not be hid. (Acts 16:2; 2 Tim 1:5)
  - 2. God also fed this faith by encouraging words from those who could prophecy. (1 Tim 1:18)
  - 3. This is our main work as a local church! Are you building and encouraging the faith of others? (Eph 4:15-16)
  - 4. What Timothy was given by these brethren he would give to others for the rest of his life. Have you experienced this?
- B. His growing faith led to more opportunities.
  - 1. He was given a spiritual gift. (2 Tim 1:6)
  - 2. He was circumcised to give doors of opportunity to serve others.
    - a. This was not a matter of personal likes.
    - b. This spirit is essential to the spread of the gospel. (1 Cor 9:19-23)
  - 3. He was given the opportunity to do the same work that resulted in Timothy's conversion and also nearly resulted in Paul's death! (Acts 16:3-5)
  - 4. He needed to be warned against falling into complacency. (2 Tim 1:6)
- C. Timothy's love for others gave him special opportunities. (Phil 2:19-23)
  - 1. We tend to open our hearts to those who really care for us! Paul showed that this attitude was rare.
  - 2. Paul sent him to take on very difficult tasks. In addition to being sent to Philippi, he was also sent to the Thessalonians and to Corinth. (1 Cor 4:16-17)
  - 3. Jesus did not want a single soul to be lost. These problems in the church needed to be addressed by someone who really cared. (Rom 14:14-15; 15:1-2)
  - 4. We have made a great mistake if we view the work of the Lord in any other way than in working with people! We must not be isolated.
  - 5. Working with people for their good *is not easy*.

Conclusion: Has the Lord molded your life to be a friend of the faithful?

- A. We need to overcome our fears and begin to reach out.
- B. Once involved in this great work you will experience a joy that is hard to describe!
