## How does love help us forgive others? <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

*Introduction:* One of the greatest challenges we will face is when a brother has hurt us. A. It is *no small thing* to have a problem in either giving or receiving forgiveness.

- 1. Forgiveness is a product of the love of God and is the basis of having a relationship with God.
- 2. Without this understanding and realization of how the love of God acts towards us, we will not be able to work with our brethren! (Jn 13:34-35)
- B. Our most basic perceptions are affected by this! (2 Pt 1:9)
- I. Many of our problems in a local church can be traced back to a failure to forgive
  - 1. Have you heard of brethren that would have nothing to do with one another? (1 Jn 3:14-16)
  - 2. Do you have animosity (hatred) for various people who have done you wrong?
  - 3. Until we learn to get out of ourselves then these things are impossible.
  - 4. Will you be "cheated" by showing mercy and longsuffering?
  - 5. There is a wonderful burden lifted when you are no longer thinking this way.
  - 6. Going from a child to being a parent gives us perspective!
  - C. We must develop an attitude of forgiveness.
    - 1. Why did Jesus and Stephen pray for forgiveness of those in sin?
      - (Lk 23:34; Acts 7:60)
    - 2. Did they receive forgiveness without any repentance in their own hearts?
    - 3. No, they were later given opportunities to repent. (Acts 2:36-38)
    - 4. Can we release our desire for personal vengeance and give it to God under all circumstances? (Rom 12:19-21)
    - 5. This goes against every instinct the world has taught us. Our failure to learn this will *guarantee a defeated life*.
    - 6. This is a must for us to move forward in a life of faith! (Phil 3:13-14)
    - 7. Without it we will be burdened and will be enslaved to past hurts.

## II. Are we honest with God and ourselves when we say we have forgiven others?

- A. What does forgiveness mean to God?
  - 1. He blots out our sins! (Acts 3:19; Isa 43:25)
  - 2. God does not remember our sins any more. (Heb 8:12)
    - a. He is described as casting them into the sea. (Micah 7:18-19)
    - b. When God forgives our sin is long gone! Do you believe this?
    - c. "When God buries our sins in the deepest sea, He posts a sign which reads: No Fishing!"
  - 3. God receives us back to a full fellowship. (Lk 15:20-24)
    - a. There is no grudge holding with God. Men are another matter!
    - b. Our biggest problem is in believing this.
- B. What do we mean? This is where the deceitful heart can do the most damage.
  - 1. "I will forgive you but I do not have to like you." (1 Jn 3:18-19; 1 Pt 1:22; 2:1)

- 2. The church is not a social club to cater to your social needs. It is a group of people who have been crushed by their own sin and have the forgiving love of God as their only bond.
- C. How do I know if I have forgiven another? Here is a test.
  - 1. Do we get pleasure in their hurt?
  - 2. Do we intentionally avoid being in their presence?
  - 3. Do we vividly remember what we have suffered?
  - 4. Are we uncomfortable when they are praised?
  - 5. Do we go out of the way to be helpful to that person?
  - 6. Are we willing to pray for the person?

## III. We must learn how to forgive others

- A. When the Lord tells us to "put on" something, we are dealing with a learning, growing process. (Col 3:12-15)
  - 1. I have seen is where brethren separate themselves under the banner of the "grace of God" by planting bitterness and strife in the hearts of their disciples.
  - 2. God's love helps us to work out our problems. (James 3:17-18)
- C. How can I develop a greater love for God? Do you remember you are forgiven?
  - 1. Consider the parable Jesus used to open the heart of a Pharisee. (Lk 7:40-43)
  - 2. Let you and I answer the question. Who loves more? The one forgiven more!
  - 3. How much have you been forgiven? (Lk 7:47)

## IV. Two men respond to those who have hurt them

- A. The first man decides that he will follow the "common sense" of the world.
  - 1. He will take hurts personally and dwells on them.
  - 2. He will seek a broader personal attack on the "transgressor."
  - 3. Human standards are sought "eye for eye"; "probation"; "a time of exile."
  - 4. The fault is never forgotten and can be quickly brought up if "needed."
- B. The first man will in time experience problems with his relationships. (Jas 3:14-16)
  - 1. He will live in a world of "throw-away people."
  - 2. He will learn to trust no one and those that know him will learn not to trust him!
- C. The second man decides to follow the mercy and forgiveness of Jesus.
  - 1. Any faults he sees in others he first remembers what Jesus did for him. (1 Tim 1:15-16)
  - 2. He wants to restore the offender's relationship to God and the relationship to himself. (2 Cor 2:7-8, 11)
  - 3. He lets the past go and has confidence in future path of his brother. (2 Cor 2:3-4; 2 Thess 3:4; Philemon 1:21)
  - 4. He will find his marriage, his children, his brethren and his friends to be blessed by his being a "son of encouragement." (Acts 4:36)
  - 5. His hurts become an opportunity to build a stronger faith and come even closer to God. (Job 42:5-6; Ps 51:16-17)

Conclusion: Which man are you?
