The Test of True Conversion <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

Introduction: True conversion is a display of a power that could only come from God.

- A. The scripture makes "matter of fact" statements about powerful things. (Rom 1:16)
 - 1. The changed hearts of men is *truly a display of God's power* and wisdom.
 - 2. What occurs in the heart *is not always seen by men*. Time will reveal it!
- B. Can I know if I have been converted to Christ?
 - 1. That which is true will be confirmed by tests! (2 Cor 13:5)
 - 2. Many of the tests will come as we face the issues of life, especially persecution and suffering. (Rom 5:3-5 NASV)
 - 3. We need to be certain where we stand with the Lord. This is the challenge for each generation.

I. What is conversion?

A. It represents a complete turning in one's life. (Mt 18:3)

<u>στρέφω</u> - (a) *turn* something *toward* someone (MT 5.39); (b) as making a change of substance *turn, change* something into something (RV 11.6); ... (c) *turn* or *change inwardly, change one's ways, be converted* (MT 18.3)

- 1. The word can be also translated repentance. It also can represent the entire process of being born again. (Acts 3:19)
- 2. The root of this change involves a turning from Satan to God. (1 Thess 1:9-10)
- 3. This goes to the very core of *who we are* and of *how we make decisions*. Over time this change will be seen!
- 4. This involves a <u>very thoughtful change</u> based upon <u>a genuine knowledge of God</u> and <u>a real change within one's heart</u>. The real bottleneck of conversion is repentance! (Acts 2:38)
- B. Conversion demands our all.
 - 1. Many look at the Lord's church as a social club. Some local churches compete to gain disciples by appealing to personal desires and tastes.
 - 2. Jesus made it clear that true disciples must first be converted.

(Lk 9:23-24; Mk 10:29-30)

- 3. Conversion is rightly likened to a death, burial and resurrection! (Rom 6:3-4)
- 4. We think differently *about everything*! We now have *a new life*. (2 Cor 5:17)
- C. God acts in conversion to remove our sins! (Acts 3:19)
 - 1. The fact of forgiveness becomes *a dominate power in our thinking* for as long as we live.
 - 2. While the guilt of our sins cannot be seen or felt, God removes them with His very hands. (Col 2:11-13)
 - 3. Conversion involves a turning to God which involves a complete change of thinking and a change of relationship'

II. Satan teaches various counterfeits that he calls conversion

A. Satan has messengers and a message that they bring. (2 Cor 11:13-15)

- 1. He will proclaim the name of "Jesus" but *not the real Jesus*. (2 Cor 11:4)
- 2. He will *be popular* and have *the approval of the world*.
- 3. His followers will fail miserably but still be popular as long as they are not put to the test! (Acts 19:13-16)
- B. At the core of Satan's "conversion" is a deep darkness and a loyalty to self.
 - 1. Reason, self-examination become illusions. (Eph 4:17-19; 5:8-11)
 - 2. A complete reversal of definitions and reality is accepted as long as I can do what I want! (Isa 5:20-21)
 - 3. In Satan's world wickedness becomes righteousness. God's law becomes sin and "legalism." Grace becomes lewdness! (Jude 4)
 - 4. These so "converted" are <u>very sensitive people</u> of whom the world must turn around. They are up and down and often very unstable.

III. Testing our own conversion

- A. We simply need to honestly <u>see our own hearts</u>! This can be a challenge.
 - 1. A hardened heart will not care. Some have worldly reasons to be "converted."
 - 2. What is our day to day decision making and our thoughts? (Col 3:1-3)
 - 3. These thoughts are a process of growth and painful, careful progress.
 - 4. People who have been converted to Jesus will show it in their actions, words and way of life. (Acts 4:12-13; 2 Tim 1:12)
- B. What do we rejoice in?
 - 1. The joy of the Lord is only experienced in converted hearts. What the world rejoices in and the converted rejoice in *is very different*. (Jn 16:20-22)
 - 2. When God is in the center of our lives we can rejoice in spiritual things while losing physical things. (Heb 10:32-34; 12:2)
 - 3. When God is in view our lives will perplex the world and point others to Him.
- C. How do we deal with our relationships?
 - 1. Converted people are *serving people*. It is not all about them. (Phil 2:14-18)
 - 2. How do we view the local church? Are they people who are <u>converted by the</u> <u>precious blood of Christ</u> or performers who <u>must satisfy my needs and wishes</u>?
 - 3. What is most important when one has offended me or sinned against me? Is the *Lord's cause* my cause or is it *really all about me*? (Eph 4:30-32)
 - 4. One of the greatest marks of spiritual maturity is seen here.
- D. Have I ever made faith my own?
 - 1. There can be real worldly motivations for "attending church." (Gal 6:12)
 - 2. The danger of hypocrisy is real. (Jer 3:10; Lk 12:1-3)
 - 3. Hypocrites can change. They must be converted.
 - 4. It is better for you to become angry and leave than to be accommodated and spread your leaven among brethren!
 - 5. Genuine conversion involves accepting strong rebuke that bring continual change! Consider Peter's later "conversion." (Lk 22:31-32)
